I. Welcome and Introductions

The monthly meeting of the Middle Peninsula Planning District Commission was held in the Regional Board Room at the Middle Peninsula Planning District Commission office in Saluda, Virginia on Wednesday, May 24, 2017, at 7:00 p.m. MPPDC Chairman Thomas Swartzwelder welcomed everyone in attendance.

II. Approval of April Minutes

Chairman Swartzwelder asked whether there were any corrections or changes to the April Minutes. There being no corrections to the Minutes, Chairman Swartzwelder requested a motion to approve the April Minutes. Ms. Conner moved that the April Minutes be approved. Ms. Feigum seconded the motion; motion carried.

III. Approval of April Financial Report

Chairman Swartzwelder asked whether there were any questions regarding the April financial report before being approved subject to audit. There being no questions, Chairman Swartzwelder requested a motion to approve the April financial report subject to audit. Ms. Conner moved to approve the April financial report subject to audit. Mr. Winebarger seconded the motion; motion carried.

IV. Executive Director's Report on Staff Activities for the Month of May

Chairman Swartzwelder requested MPPDC Executive Director, Lewie Lawrence review the Executive Director's Report on Staff Activities for the month of May. The Executive Director's Report on staff activities is developed at a monthly staff meeting, organized by PDC Service Centers, and the activities are used to report grant funding activities.

Mr. Lawrence directed Commissioners' attention to several items:

- The Middle Peninsula PDC General Services Agreement member localities interested in commissioning PDC staff to provide professional services to update the State mandated Middle Peninsula Water Supply Plan had until May 15 to take action on this agreement. The agreement is optional and local governments can choose to use the PDC for the update or handle compliance deficiencies recommended for the update on their own. To date, almost all localities have reported back with Mathews County choosing to update on their own. The plan should ramp up over the next 18 months.
- The Living Shoreline Incentive Program RLF has had a tremendous response since its inception. Currently, one application has been approved and one is pending with many more applications in the queue. There have been numerous inquiries from residents of outside localities but due to limited funding, only residents within the PDC jurisdiction are eligible. It may be possible for the PDC to serve as a model for outside localities in an effort to expand the program and its benefits.
- Staff attended the DEQ Phase III Chesapeake Bay TMDL Staff Workshop held at King and Queen County Public Library. Phase III WIP is due April 2019 and will focus more on engagement with localities – identifying actions and practices to be implemented 2018-2025, accounting for climate change and the Conowingo Dam closing in Maryland, growth, and developing plans below statewide goals. No regulatory requirements for localities to do anything BUT if goals are not met through voluntary action, that could change. The state needs to have the draft state WIP to EPA by December 2018. DEQ is asking what resources do localities need to implement their local strategies? Localities will be asked to participate in meetings, identify and report existing BMPs, continue with permitting requirements, identify pollutant reductions that are implemented, and take advantage of funding opportunities to implement strategies. The Chesapeake Bay Model now allows nonmonetized credits for shoreline management practices. There will be some credit given for practices implemented since 2014 including living shorelines and even for riprap and rock revetments, but none for bulkheads or breakwaters unless they include plantings.

- The MPCBPAA Eco-Business program documents have been updated with new application submission dates. MPCBPAA will accept applications on a rolling basis. Eco-Business program documents will be placed on the MPCBPAA website. A splash page was drafted that will introduce the program to the public and officially open the application process for entrepreneurs.
- Mr. Lawrence reported the Onsite Repair and Pumpout program has had a lot of activity with 22 pumpout applications mailed, 11 vouchers conveyed and 4 completions to date.
- The PDC drafted a resolution for localities to support the MPPDC in its application to designate the Middle Peninsula region of Virginia as an economic development district through the U.S. Economic Development Administration. Mr. Lawrence pointed out this program is zeroed out on President Trump's proposed budget. The PDC can submit an application but funding may not be available.
- The Pamunkey Tribe Broadband Management Team met to discuss work to be performed by Design Nine to provide technical design and cost estimates for a Middle Peninsula Broadband system to provide wireless coverage to the region. Design Nine will conduct an assessment of each county's 911 system and assets. Working from the King and Queen model, the system would be run by the Pamunkey Tribe. RCC could provide training for a local workforce to maintain the system. Marketing and awareness will be key to the success of any local/regional system. There is 90 days to complete the project. The team will look at different solutions and partnerships. Mr. Lawrence mentioned that HB1686, permitting Indian tribes recognized by the federal government to join planning district commissions as members, will take effect July 1. Mr. Lawrence will extend an invitation to the Pamunkey Tribe to attend one of the Commission meetings.
- PDC staff developed a draft MSAT Satellite Telephone Asset Transfer
 Agreement and submitted to localities for review. Once finalized, the
 regional emergency planner will assign satellite telephones to localities,
 schedule a training and equipment distribution meeting for Emergency
 Managers, and activate the service. The grant provides for 2 years of service.

V. Public Comment

None.

VI. Discussion of FEMA Floodplain Permitting Issues

Executive Director Lawrence gave an overview of the proposed changes to the FEMA Guidance for Floodplain Permitting and the VA Department of Conservation and Recreation's Floodplain Management Ordinance. Mr. Lawrence explained the

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Review, Assess, and Document (RAD) process and what the proposed changes will mean to local government and its citizens. FEMA is moving towards a more rigorous permitting process for all "Man Made Changes" within flood prone areas.

VII. Report on the Rural Coastal Summit and Open Discussion

Delegate Keith Hodges reported that the Rural Coastal Summit had an excellent turnout with over 100 people in attendance with almost every coastal locality being represented. Also in attendance were Rep. Rob Wittman and Sen. Tim Kaine. Del. Hodges referred to the Summit as an excellent educational opportunity with its main purpose of gaining local attention being served. The next step is a motion or vote from local governments to join the Rural Coastal Virginia Community Enhancement Authority. Del. Hodges will draft a sample resolution to be presented to local governments over the next few weeks.

VIII. Report from the Nominating Committee

January 2017 Commission Meeting Minutes - On a motion by Mr. Hill and seconded by Mr. Rivara, the Commission will maintain the current slate of officers for FY18. Mr. Hill so moved; Mr. Rivara seconded the motion; motion carried.

IX. Report from the Budget & OPD Committee

- Lewie Lawrence, Executive Director provided a handout and briefed the Commission on the President's FY2018 Budget Request which includes the elimination of many Environmental, Community and Economic Development Programs. Mr. Lawrence explained the impact this could have on the PDC budget for the upcoming year.
- Finance Director Beth Johnson presented the Commission with a draft of the FY18 budget that was prepared in anticipation of projected cuts at the federal level. The proposed budget was designed to be sustainable keeping all current staff employed should these projected cuts take place. The cuts could represent a decrease of up to 48% funding for the PDC over the budget that had been originally considered. It is fully anticipated that the Commission will need to adopt an amended budget in the fall once the full impact of federal budget cuts for FY18 is known. The draft budget was adopted by the Commission as presented. This is a very conservative budget requiring leaving vacant one planner position.

Chairman Swartzwelder requested a motion to adopt the draft Recommended Overall Program Design and Budget for FY18. Mr. Moskalski moved to adopt the FY18 MPPDC draft Recommended Overall Program Design and Budget as presented. Dr. Reay seconded the motion; motion carried.

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X. Other Business

• Chesapeake Bay Foundation Boat Tour

Mr. Lawrence presented the Commission with an invitational flyer from the Chesapeake Bay Foundation. Middle Peninsula leaders are invited on a boat tour of the Bay, its rivers and streams as an opportunity for leaders to interface with CBF staff.

XI. Adjournment

Chairman Swartzwelder requested a motion to adjourn the meeting. Mr. Moskalski so moved; Mr. Raey seconded. The motion carried.

WHAT IS MPPDC?

The Middle Peninsula Planning District Commission (MPPDC) was established pursuant to the Virginia Area Development Act (Title 15.1, Chapter 34, Sections 15.1-1400, et seq., Code of Virginia (1950) as amended) and by joint resolutions of the governing bodies of its constituent member jurisdictions.

The "MPPDC" describes the geographic section of Virginia which encompasses the Counties of Essex. Gloucester. King and Queen, King William, Mathews and Middlesex and the Towns of Tappahannock, Urbanna and West Point.

MPPDC: Membership, Appointments, Committee Assignments, and Networks

Coastal Policy Team (CPT) - The CPT, whose members and alternates represent the Virginia Coastal Zone Management Program's key partners and eight planning district commissions, provides a forum for discussion and resolution of cross-cutting coastal resource management issues. Members serve on the team at the discretion of their agency or planning district commission director. The CPT recommends funding levels to the DEQ Director for coastal zone management projects. (MPPDC Staff 15 years +)

Congressman Robert Wittman's Fisheries Advisory Committee and Environmental Advisory Committee (MPPDC Staff 8 years +)

Virginia Sea Grant Program External Advisory Committee (EAC): The EAC provides stakeholder input on the strategic planning process, the research proposal review process, and on Commonwealth-wide trends and needs. The EAC is a diverse group of end-users including representatives from state agencies, the education community, coastal planning and management, the private sector, and NGOs. (MPPDC Staff 9 years+)

The Association for Commuter Transportation (ACT) (Telework Council Secretary): ACT is the premier association for professionals and organizations whose focus is the delivery of commuting options and solutions for an efficient transportation system. The Telework Council is concerned with promoting telework and providing telework information and technical assistance to employers (MPPDC Staff 10 years+)

Middle Peninsula Northern Neck Coordinated Human Services Mobility Committee: provides direction for a unified comprehensive strategy for transportation service delivery in the Middle Peninsula and Northern Neck Planning Districts focused on unmet transportation needs of seniors, people with disabilities, and people with low incomes. (MPPDC Staff 12 years)

The Coastal Society - The Coastal Society is an organization of private sector, academic, and government professionals and students. The Society is dedicated to actively addressing emerging coastal issues by fostering dialogue, forging partnerships, and promoting communications and education. (MPPDC staff serves as a Director)

Hurricane Evacuation Coordination Workgroup - The Hurricane Evacuation Coordination Workgroup is comprised of state and local emergency representatives tasked with finding solutions to fill in the gaps in the Commonwealth's and Locality's plans to respond to a Major Hurricane Evacuation.

Shelter Location Identification Subcommittee of the Hurricane Evacuation Coordination Workgroup -local and state experts tasked with identifying state and local shelter locations that can meet the needs of individuals with access and functional needs. A recent federal court ruling indicates that prior knowledge of shelter locations allows for more complete personal preparedness planning

Shelter Staffing Subcommittee of the Hurricane Evacuation Coordination Workgroup -local and state experts tasked with recommending solutions to alleviate staffing limitations in emergency shelters

Eastern Virginia Groundwater Management Advisory Committee (EVGMAC) Workgroup #2B – EVGMAC is charged with assisting the State Water Commission and DEQ in developing, revising and implementing a management strategy for groundwater in Eastern Virginia Groundwater Management Area. Group #2B will identify trading options and programs used in other states; evaluate how trading programs might help with future growth and development, and individual and regional solutions; and evaluate feasibility, data needs, cost and possible participants.

Stakeholder Advisory Group for fees related to the consolidated Virginia Erosion and Stormwater Management Program - Item 8 of Chapters 68 and 758 of the 2016 Acts of Assembly directed Virginia Stormwater Management Program Authorities and Virginia Erosion and Sediment Control Program Authorities to submit information to DEQ by August 1, 2016 and directed DEQ to conduct its evaluation based on revenues and resource needs from July 1, 2014, to June 30, 2016.

Project 30502 Water Supply Planning

9 VAC 25-780 establishes a planning process and criteria that all local governments will use in the development of local or regional water plans. The plan will be reviewed by the Department of Environmental Quality and a determination will be made by the State Water Control Board on whether the plan complies with this regulation. Within five years of a compliance determination by the board, the plan will be reviewed to assess adequacy and any significant changes will require the submission of an amended plan and review by the board. All local programs will be reviewed, revised, and resubmitted to the Department of Environmental Quality every 10 years after the last approval. The jurisdictions of Essex, King and Queen, King William, Mathews, Middlesex, Tappahannock, Urbanna and West Point opted to prepare a regional plan with assistance from Middle Peninsula Planning District Commission staff and EEE Consulting, an environmental consulting firm. The Regional Plan was completed and submitted to the Virginia Department of Environmental Quality for compliance review by the November 2, 2011 deadline for Regional Plan submission.

- Provided Mindy Connor, Mathews County, with a copy of the 2011 Regional Water Supply Plan.
- Reviewed a letter from DEQ to Mathews County that provides guidance to the Mathews County Board of Supervisors with regard to the County's responsibilities if they decide not to participate in the MPPDC Regional Water Supply Update.
- Reviewed a letter from Tammy Stephenson (DEQ) that outlined the MPPDC's responsibilities with
 regard to water supply planning should Mathews County withdraw from the regional plan. According to
 the letter, "there is no compliance reason for the MPPDC to re-write the regional supply plan to exclude
 Mathews County...the County and MPPDC can plan separately if the Mathews County Board of
 Supervisors determines that is in the County's best interest. The Water Supply Planning Regulation is
 silent with regard to a locality opting out of a regional plan and resubmitting a local plan, particularly at
 the midpoint of its term."
- Based on a motion taken at the regular meeting of the Board of Supervisors of Mathews County on May 23, 2017, Mathews County has decided not to participate in the MPPDC update of the Water Supply Plan. Therefore MPPDC staff began to remove Mathews County information from the current Water Supply Plan Update draft document. A list of maps and figures that will need updating has been created. Updates to such maps and figures will remove Mathews County.
- Received a Board Order from the Mathews County Board of Supervisors indicating the Board of Supervisors has motioned to not use MPPDC professional services to update the Water Supply Plan.
- Consulted with Scott Kudlas, Virginia Department of Environmental Quality Director of the Office of Water Supply concerning the removal of Mathews County from the Middle Peninsula Regional Groundwater Management Plan. Discussed the process for how the remaining jurisdictions will be evaluated for compliance without Mathews County.
- Consulted with Andrew Kassoff, President of EEE Consulting concerning the removal of Mathews
 County from the Middle Peninsula Regional Water Supply Plan and the steps necessary to update the
 plan moving forward.
- Continued to update the Water Supply Plan including demographic information, maps, and community water system data.
- Sent an email to The County Club of West Point in an attempt to update information in the Water Supply Plan regarding a flow meter that was to have been installed in the Spring of 2008.

 Provided EEE Consultants with information regarding alternative sources of water for economic development or human consumption, including barrow pits, drilling into the basement and impounding of ditch water.

Middle Peninsula Chesapeake Bay Public Access Authority Special Project – Support of Executive Order 23, Goal 8 Coastal Management Coordination Public Access: Continue implementation of adopted annual work program, including identifying land, either owned by the Commonwealth or private holdings that can be secured for use by the general public as a public access site; researching and determining ownership of all identified sites; determining appropriate public use levels of identified access sites; developing appropriate mechanism for transferring title of Commonwealth or private holdings to the Authority; developing appropriate acquisition and site management plan. This Program allows the Authority to function by supporting the individual projects and operations of the Authority, as well as, by responding to daily requests for assistance from local government staff.

Project 32016 - VIMS Living Shoreline

MPPDC submitted a proposal to the National Fish and Wildlife Foundation for VIMS. The objective of this project is to leverage previous funding from NFWF to install oyster bag sills at two publicly-owned (MPCBPAA) properties on and monitor them for a year. In addition, existing oyster bag sill installations at four private locations will be monitored to determine overall project effectiveness. This work will provide recommendations for installations along fetch-limited shorelines of Chesapeake Bay.

Project 31500 - Living Shoreline Incentive Program RLF

This program provides low interest loans to homeowners to install living shorelines as defined by § 28.2-104.1 of the Code of Virginia: "Living shoreline" means a shoreline management practice that provides erosion control and water quality benefits; protects, restores or enhances natural shoreline habitat; and maintains coastal processes through the strategic placement of plants, stone, sand fill, and other structural and organic materials. Revolving loan program capitalization provided through an interest free loan from the Virginia Clean Water Revolving Loan Fund through the Virginia Resources Authority.

- Consulted with Kevin McLean, Virginia Conservation Assistance Program Coordinator regarding Virginia Association for Soil and Water Conservation Districts' Virginia Conservation Assistance Program (VCAP) and ability to partner with MPPDC to fund living shoreline projects. - Consulted with Kevin McLean, Virginia Association of Soil and Water Conservation Districts regarding

 living shorelines.

If the Commonwealth is unable to meet the phosphorous, nitrogen and sediment reduction targets assigned to us by EPA, we will need to develop new programs or strategies to address those reductions based on any requirements established by EPA."

Project 32139 - Eco-Business Framework

The PAA in partnership with MPPDC staff will explore new approaches to allow privately owned eco-business ventures to operate on publicly owned land to encourage new and innovative environmentally sensitive business that that showcases and preserves PAA land.

Project 30420/30428 - On-Site Technical Guidance Assistance and Revolving Loan Program

The On-Site Technical Guidance Program aids the Middle Peninsula localities and residents in the technical understanding and implementation of approaches to address On-Site Disposal Systems and improve water quality by assisting local homeowners with repairing failing septic systems through low-interest loans and/or grants. In addition MPDC received funding under the Water Quality Improvement Fund (WQIF) to provide grants to low to moderate income Middle Peninsula and New Kent County homeowners to repair failing septic systems impacting water quality and health in the region. Grants can be paired with loans from the MPPDC Onsite Wastewater Revolving Loan Fund to provide matching funds as required. It is anticipated this funding will be used to provide assistance to 20-27 homeowners.

- Consulted with Allen Farmer, Farmers Septic regarding estimates for Gloucester and Mathews septic repairs.
- Approved funding for Gloucester septic repair approved for \$3881.25 grant on a \$5115 septic repair. Homeowner will provide 25% cost share in lieu of loan.
- Approved funding for Mathews septic repair approved for \$10,292 \$7,719 in grant funding and \$2,573 loan for 60 months at 2% interest. This is a repair to an alternative system installation funded by MPPDC in 2009.

MPPDC agreed to service Middle Peninsula Business Development Partnership's (MPBDP) Small Business Loan Portfolio after MPBDP's dissolution November 30, 2011. MPPDC established a revolving loan fund and staff initiate ACH loan payments from clients bank accounts and manages the accounts. Principal repaid will be held until the Commission determines the best use for these funds as allowed by the USDA (RBEG) original lending restrictions. Interest earned will be used to offset administration costs.

• Executed ACH loan payments for MPBDP. All MPPDC loan funding programs require that loan recipients authorize loan payments to be made automatically from loan recipients' bank accounts. Loan clients authorize the payments at loan closing (ACH Authorizations). MPPDC staff process these payments on the 15th of each month. This has significantly reduced defaults and delinquent repayments of MPPDC loans.

<u>Project 30109 – Staff Support to Middle Peninsula Economic Development Resource Organization (MPEDRO)</u>

MPPDC staff are providing clerical and fiscal assistance to the Middle Peninsula Economic Development Resource Organization.

Project 300132 - Energy Efficiency and Conservation Block Grant (EECBG) Revolving Loan Fund

The program emphasizes a community-based approach to help meet energy and climate protection goals. MPPDC was awarded a contract to provide weatherization renovations to 12 homeowners ineligible for LMI weatherization programs in each of the 6 counties. MPPDC subcontracted the promotion and construction portions of this project to Bay Aging but was tasked with administering the overall project. MPPDC is administering the revolving loan program per DMME.

All MPPDC loan funding programs require that loan recipients authorize loan payments to be made automatically from loan recipients' bank accounts. Loan clients authorize the payments at loan closing (ACH Authorizations). These payments occur the 15th of each month. This has significantly reduced defaults and delinquent repayments of MPPDC loans as well as collection efforts.

EMERGENCY SERVICES

Funding - Pending

Project 31204 - Regional Emergency Management Planner

Regional Emergency Planner position housed at the Middle Peninsula Planning District Commission (MPPDC) in Saluda. The Middle Peninsula crosses VDEM Region 1&5 boundaries. Position will support local Emergency Coordinators by assisting/coordinating homeland security & disaster response preparedness; Rt. 17 evacuation planning; & resource data collection.

- Wrote three grants to the 2017 State Homeland Security Grant Program administered by VDEM. The grants are: Support for the Regional Emergency Planner position at the MPPDC; funding for hiring a contractor to develop a Regional Debris Management Plan; and funding to hire a consultant to stand up a regional Mass Casualty exercise. The grants are competitive and will be awarded in October 2017. Total funding requested was \$202,473.
- Participated in a *Crisis Track* regional exercise in Mathews County. Crisis Track is damage assessment software provided this year by VDEM to each locality to be used to quickly and efficiently assess damage

- to property after a disaster. To date the software has been used with great success in Colonial Beach during their Spring 2017 wind event.
- Participated in the Mass Care Task Force virtual meeting. The task force, of which the Regional Emergency Planner is a member, continues to move forward with developing recommendations for improving the State plan to care for displaced citizens during disasters in the Commonwealth.
- Participated in the Middle Peninsula/Northern Neck EOP Workshop in Gloucester County. The purpose
 of the Workshop is to discuss plan elements to be included in a Regional EOP Template, including an
 Access and Functional Needs Annex and an MOU for supporting jurisdictions in the region during an
 emergency. The workshop is part of the EOP Gap Analysis SHSP grant awarded to the MPPDC in 2016.
 All localities, represented mainly by the local Emergency Managers, from the Middle Peninsula and
 Northern Neck have been invited to participate in this project.

Project 31205 - MSAT Phones

This project will procure and deploy one satellite phone for each locality's Emergency Manager, total of 6, to develop a redundant level of satellite based communications to regionally assist the localities in the event of a catastrophic event. The participating localities will share a local Middle Peninsula Emergency Management coordination talkgroup to facilitate local support. The phones are compatible with the statewide VDEM/Virginia EOC talkgroup, the Urban Search and Rescue Program, and federal level assets through use of the SMART talkgroups deployed nationwide in the satellite phones.

• Procured 6 Satellite Radiophones with accessories. Phones will be activated and distributed to Emergency Managers in the 6 Counties of the Middle Peninsula by July 1.
