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MIDDLE PENINSULA PLANNING DISTRICT COMMISSION February 22, 2023 Saluda, Virginia

I. <u>Welcome and Introductions</u>

The monthly meeting of the Middle Peninsula Planning District Commission was held in the Regional Board Room at the Middle Peninsula Planning District Commission office in Saluda, Virginia on Wednesday, February 22, 2023 at 7:00 p.m. MPPDC Chairman, Chriscoe welcomed everyone in attendance.

II. <u>Approval of January Minutes</u>

Chairman Chriscoe asked whether there were any corrections or changes to the January Minutes. There being no corrections to the Minutes, Chairman Chriscoe requested a motion to approve the January Minutes. Mr. Moren moved that the January Minutes be approved. Mr. Goldsmith seconded the motion; motion carried.

III. <u>Approval of Financial Report for January</u>

MPPDC Chief Financial Officer, Heather Modispaw presented the Financial Report for January. Chairman Chriscoe asked whether there were any questions regarding the MPPDC financial report for January before being approved subject to audit. There being no questions, Chairman Chriscoe requested a motion to approve the financial report for January subject to audit. Mr. Moskalski moved to approve the financial report for January subject to audit. Ms. Vivian Seay seconded the motion; motion carried.

IV. Executive Director's Report on Staff Activities for the Month of February

Chairman Chriscoe requested MPPDC Executive Director, Lewie Lawrence review the Executive Director's Report on Staff Activities for February. The Executive Director's Report on staff activities is developed at a monthly staff meeting, organized by PDC Service Centers, and the activities are used to report grant funding activities.

Mr. Lawrence directed the Commissioners' attention to a few items:

- Staff received three RFP bids for the Mill Creek Boat Ramp, including bids from Wetland Studies and Solutions, Inc., Ready Reef Inc., and Bay Design Group. RFP bid packets were checked for order and completeness. *Mr. Lawrence reported some of these companies are also involved in Fight-the-Flood projects.*
- Consulted with VDOT and Bay Design concerning the ownership and survey of what is public owned and what is not. *Mr. Lawrence stated this has created some difficulties as there is no record of the Middlesex County Board of Supervisors taking ownership and the counties legal team hit a dead end on the title search.*
- Contracted with Mark Mansfield with Shore Consulting Group on behalf of Middlesex County to request an extension to the soon to expire Mill Creek dredging permit. With the Middle Peninsula Section 408 categorical exemption in place, the ACE was able to grant an additional 12 months to the expired permit to allow Middlesex to dredge the ramp. *Mr. Lawrence reported the county has asked how to get the permit renewed and is looking at options for proceeding.*
- Received preliminary notice from GO Virginia that the grant proposal to enhance the DCR West Point Bridge Study will be awarded in the near future. The study will evaluate the structural design and possible future industrial uses on Town owned property which will require different loading weights to cross the bridge. *Mr. Lawrence reported he had met with Program Director, Ian Ginger and presented this project, which was then fast tracked, and approved by the Region 6 Board but then the Board quickly decided not to fund it.*
- Attended the Virginia Sea Grant GO Virginia Water Management Economy business competition winner's symposium held at the Virginia Museum of History and Culture in Richmond to discuss business progress to-date, challenges and overall progress. *Mr. Lawrence reported this event was part of the \$6M GO Virginia grant. This event was the first time everyone has been able to gather together and was a great benefit.*
- Testified at the General Assembly in support of House Bill 1804 Tidal wetland mitigation banks. This bill will modify the trading boundaries making it easier for those generating credits in rural coastal areas to sell credits. *Mr. Lawrence stated this bill changes the way the watershed structure was established and is beneficial to local businesses.*

Tidal wetland mitigation bank credits: Authorizes certain entities to purchase or use credits from a tidal wetland mitigation bank located in an adjacent river watershed when such bank contains substantially the same plant community type and salinity regime as the impacted

> wetlands, which shall be the preferred form of compensation. The provisions of the bill apply only to tidal wetland mitigation banks in certain subbasins when a tidal wetland mitigation bank with substantially the same plant community type and salinity regime as the impacted wetlands is not available in the same river watershed as the impacted wetland.

- MPPDC staff coordinated a joint meeting between MPPDC and Hampton Roads PDC with FEMA and DCR staff to discuss Floodplain Management Technical Assistance on January 25th. Josh Lippert, FEMA advised of a policy process named "RAD" which allows for non-impact improvements to occur without the need for a permit to be issued. MPPDC is working with FEMA on the process necessary for local governments to propose a RAD solution. *Mr. Lawrence reported Josh Lippert, FEMA was asked to provide a copy of the model policy. Mr. Lippert's response was they can't locate any examples for our region. DCR is now reviewing Henrico Counties policy after it had been referred to and questioned as to why they are exempt. The Middle Peninsula will now have to find resources to develop a policy. Mr. Lawrence will keep the Commission informed.*
- Received final response from DCR regarding scope amendment request submitted in August. DCR has approved the scope change to focus on designing and dredging Broad Creek to address immediate shoaling conditions; however, DCR has disallowed grant funds to be used for the design of resilience and flood protections structures for the mouth of Broad Creek with no explanation offered regarding this unanticipated decision. Still awaiting final approval from DCR staff as of January. Notified agency director again to request assistance. Provided update to the Middlesex County Board Chair and Administrator and requested guidance regarding how to proceed. *Mr. Lawrence reported DCR authorizes dredging but won't authorize designing a jetty to prevent recurrence.*

V. <u>MPCBPAA Update</u>

MPCBPAA Chairman, John Edwards reported there's an abundance of activity at Captain Sinclairs as construction of the new public fishing pier is well underway. The PAA is scheduled to meet in March.

VI. <u>MPA Update</u>

MPA Chairman, Ashley Chriscoe reported the IRS has not made any progress. The MPA is still waiting on the IRS and hopes they can reconvene as soon as this matter has been resolved.

VII. <u>MPPDC Public Relations/Communications Update</u>

Paddlers Gone Wild: Stephanie Heinatz, Consociate Media reported Paddler's Gone Wild rack cards are still in the process of being printed and hopes to share them at the March Commission meeting. In the upcoming weeks, the PAA will be launching a crowdfunding campaign to raise money for the fishing pier at Captain Sinclair's.

Commuter Assistance Program: Ms. Heinatz reported during Covid, the focus of MidPenRideShare became teleworking and has now shifted to being primarily commuter and rideshare focused. To increase awareness and sign ups, MidPenRideShare will be present at community events throughout the Middle Peninsula and will also request more involvement from communications teams in each Middle Peninsula locality.

Commission Communications: Ms. Heinatz reported the press release on grant value in the region accrued over the last two years, will be going out to regional and statewide media outlets at the conclusion of the current General Assembly Session. The blue catfish press release has been distributed and there was interest from VA Gazette and Tidewater Review in the dredging "win" press release.

Regional Branding Initiatives: Ms. Heinatz reported the Visit Tappahannock and Essex County rack cards have been released. A media fam tour has been planned for this spring in Tappahannock and Essex County. Results will be shared with the Commission should there be an opportunity for other localities to use this model for regional tourism marketing. King and Queen County are also working on their tourism brand roll out and a new website will be coming online in the near future.

VIII. <u>Public Comment</u>

None.

IX. <u>General Assembly Update</u>

MPPDC Executive Director, Lewie Lawrence provided an update on the General Assembly Session Report submitted by Robert Crockett, Advantus Strategies. The House and Senate negotiators remain \$1B apart. If the House and Senate are unable to reach a compromise, a Special Session will be needed to finish their work amendments to the Governor's budget. Both the House and Senate budgets contain \$2M for the Governor's Catfish Industries Development Fund and the corresponding bills have passed both the Senate and the House. Del. Hodges' HB 1941, making certain businesses eligible for septic repairs through DEQ's Revolving Loan Fund, and HB 2393, giving the Secretary of Natural and Historic Resource more flexibility and access to expertise from a consortium of research in permitting regulations and guidelines (in addition to VIMS) are advancing to the Governor's desk for signature.

X. <u>C&F Line of Credit</u>

MPPDC Executive Director, Lewie Lawrence drew the Commission's attention to a draft of the application for a \$100,000.00 unsecured line of credit at Citizens & Farmers bank in their meeting packet. Mr. Lawrence reported this line of credit will ensure adequate cash flow for reimbursable grant contracts. Mr. Lawrence complimented C&F Bank for helping to customize a financial product to backstop the work of the Commission. Northern Virginia Regional Commission was the only other PDC with this type of funding and theirs was used as a model to devise the MPPDC's. Mr. Lawrence will be working with C&F to develop a policy on advance draws.

MPPDC Chairman, Ashley Chriscoe requested a motion to approve the line of credit as

presented. Ms. Seay so moved, Mr. Moskalski seconded; motion carried.

XI. Virginia Waterways Maintenance Fund Update

MPPDC Executive Director, Lewie Lawrence reported there is \$4M available under this round of VPA Waterways Maintenance Funding. Staff will be submitting an application requesting ~\$670k to cover the gap in project costs for Davis Creek. A second application will be submitted requesting ~\$1M to develop and implement the first steps (including site purchase/lease of top priority locations) of a regional master plan for dredge material management that will involve identifying optimal strategies for disposal, reuse, and manufacturing of dredged material from local creeks. In order to access this funding, a certified floodplain manager has to endorse one of the forms. Currently, Gloucester and King & Queen Counties are the only MP localities that have a certified floodplain manager. Mr. Lawrence has been working with legal counsel, Sands Anderson and will keep the Commission updated.

XII. <u>Regional Reassessment Discussion – Ashley Chriscoe</u>

MPPDC Chairman, Ashley Chriscoe reported of an opportunity available for Gloucester County's Assessor to assist other MP localities and if so desired, a meeting can be arranged. At the request of those present, Mr. Chriscoe will arrange a meeting between Gloucester County's Assessor and interested localities.

XIII. <u>Committee Appointments</u>

o OPD & Budget Committee

Chairman Chriscoe appointed representatives to the OPD & Budget Committee. Mr. Edwards moved to approve the appointments made by Chairman Chriscoe to the OPD & Budget Committee. Mr. Moskalski seconded the motion; motion carried. The following Board members were appointed:

COASTAL COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT/ ENVIRONMENTAL Funding – VDEQ, VIMS, VDCR, local match from MPPDC General Fund & partners

Project 30186 – Elevated Septic Pilot FY22

Construction of a vertically elevated septic system will occur at the King & Queen Telehealth and Business Development Center as part of a three-year pilot program to `analyze an engineered septic unit that houses and treats all sewage effluent in a vertically elevated, self-contained unit suitable for areas with high water tables and flooding in Coastal Virginia.

• Continued to coordinate with Triangle Environmental regarding designs and structural modifications for elevated septic systems for commercial application at the King and Queen facility. Discussed water usage and energy efficiency improvements to both grey and black water.

Project 30190 – DCR Flood Fund - Hoskins Creek (Tappahannock)

Project is to design, obtain permits for, and construct a living shoreline on the Town-owned property adjacent to the Rte. 17 bridge over Hoskins Creek in Tappahannock.

Project 30191 – DCR Flood Fund – Mill Creek Boat Ramp (Middlesex)

Project is to design and develop a draft Joint Permit Application for the shoreline and structures adjacent to the boat ramp at the Carlton Road (Mill Creek) public wharf in Middlesex. The designed solution will help mitigate the shoaling of the boat ramp and enhance the overall resilience of the public wharf.

- Staff received three RFP bids for the Mill Creek Boat Ramp, including bids from Wetland Studies and Solutions, Inc., Ready Reef Inc., and Bay Design Group. RFP bid packets were checked for order and completeness, ranked and scored. Preliminary negotiations are underway with the top scoring response.
- Consulted with VMRC and Middlesex County concerning accreted sand and land ownership.

Project 30192 – DCR/FEMA - Fight the Flood GIS Tool Enhancements

Improvements will be made to the FTF online and GIS tools which are intended to enhance the GIS data tool capabilities and the overall management of the program. Improvements will include automated programs to expedite and streamline the grant application process, programs for identifying needs and advancing projects which align with available funding resources, improvements which will help feature products and services for participating FTF businesses, and training for MPPDC staff.

- Received a response from Donna Milligan at VIMS about the methodology to select the most vulnerable shorelines in the Middle Peninsula. Based off the receive information MPPDC staff will use data layers available in the Shoreline Management Model created by VIMS, adaptva.org, and the All-Hazards Mitigation Plan Hazus Model to identify the most vulnerable shorelines are in the region.
- Held meetings with Timmons Group to discuss the additional updates to the dashboard maps and survey questions. Timmons also developed and shared a FTF GIS Update Workflow for the dashboard visualizations. This will help MPPDC staff update dashboards as more participates join the FTF network.

Project 30193 – DCR Flood Fund - West Point Bridge Study

Project is to conduct a Hydrologic and Hydraulic Study and Structural Design and Level of Service Study to address ongoing flooding for a Town owned bridge adjacent to the Middle Peninsula Regional Airport.

• Continued conversation with Virginia Sea Grant on ways to cover the match requirement of both DCR Flood fund award and GO Virginia award since it was decided that DCR Flood Funds cannot be used as match for GO Virginia.

Project 32015 – Staff Support to Middle Peninsula Chesapeake Bay Public Access Authority (MPCBPAA)

Middle Peninsula Chesapeake Bay Public Access Authority Special Project – Support of Executive Order 23, Goal 8 Coastal Management Coordination Public Access: Continue implementation of adopted annual work program, including identifying land, either owned by the Commonwealth or private holdings that can be secured for use by the general public as a public access site; researching and determining ownership of all identified sites; determining appropriate public use levels of identified access sites; developing appropriate mechanism for transferring title of Commonwealth or private holdings to the Authority; developing appropriate acquisition and site management plan. This Program allows the Authority to function by supporting the individual projects and operations of the Authority, as well as, by responding to daily requests for assistance from local government staff.

- Drafted and distributed press release regarding public fundraiser for needed funds for the PAA Captain Sinclairs public fishing pier construction.
- Convened the bi-monthly meeting of the Middle Peninsula Chesapeake Bay Public Access Authority. Discussed the status of the new public fishing pier and cost associated with ADA costs and engineering upgrade costs as well as housing improvements at Capt. Sinclair's.
- Submitted claim to VACORP regarding trespassing vessel that caused damage to the pier at Perrins Wharf. An eyewitness has provided his name, phone number, and information which has been also given to VACORP for their investigation.
- Staff applied and submitted a grant application to Virginia Outdoors Foundation Get Outdoors Funding for \$25,000 for the building of unimproved trails at Captain Sinclairs Recreational Area.
- Continued development of marketing assets for fishing pier construction fundraiser to include development of a new landing page on the PAA website to showcase the fundraiser, edits to the DonorBox tool to accept donations, photography of t-shirts and coozies to be used as rewards for donors and finalization of press release promoting fundraiser.

Project 32019 – Sinclair's Public Fishing Pier

The MPCBPAA has contracted the MPPDC to administer a grant from the VA Saltwater Recreational Fishing Development Fund to rehabilitate the public fishing pier at the Captain Sinclair's Recreational Area, which had fallen into a state of disrepair. The project will consist of procuring a qualified contractor to rebuild a traditional wooden framed open pile 400-feet long public use fishing pier that will provide yearround opportunities for saltwater fishing and recreational viewing.

- New pier construction continues.
- Provided updates to the PAA board.
- Submitted progress report to MRC.

Project 32021 – PAA GO VA Sea Grant Resilience Economy

Virginia Sea Grant was awarded a GO Virginia award to assist the Middle Peninsula and other coastal areas with developing a water management economy to combat flooding and sea-level rise. This project will utilize land owned by the MPCBPAA as field stations to encourage business innovation in the flood resiliency space.

- Participated in a VIMS meeting with the Office of Sponsored Programs regarding match documentation requirements for the Go Virginia/Rise Water Management Economy Grant. Suggested that all documentation for contributed-forgone rent offered by the Public Access Authority can be reported at one time as the rent was forgone upon approval of the grant with Go Virginia. The suggestion provided by MPPDC was confirmed by GO Virginia to be correct.
- Continued to assist water management business competition winners move into applied implementation space using PAA sites and other public holdings.

Project 32157 – NFWF Mathews – East River Yr2

This project will design, permit, construct and monitor living shoreline in targeted shorelines on the East River.

- Construction has reached the 95% level, with time of year restrictions remaining for plant install.
- Sent photographs of this project to NFWF for a lunch presentation on The Hill. These photos showcase living shorelines constructed with NFWF funds.

Project 32164 – CZM 306 Next Generation Shoreline Plan (Pilot Project – Yr1)

VIMS Shoreline Studies Program will develop a whitepaper to examine the use of technology, modeling, alternative materials, proprietary products, and innovative nature-based mitigation measures in the planning process for "next generation shorelines" which are intended to provide an enhanced level of shoreline resilience and water quality in response to more frequent and severe flooding and accelerated sea-level rise. One design of a next generation shoreline for a publicly owned property in a high energy wave environment will be completed. Year 2 will involve further development of the whitepaper and a next generation shoreline design for a moderate wave energy publicly owned site.

- Project extended through September 2023.
- Continued to consult with Consociate Media to develop a communications strategy for succinctly explaining the new planning methodology.
- Developed outline script and framework for communications of Next Generation Shoreline Plan materials.

Project 32166 – Fight the Flood Participant Grant Application Development

MPPDC staff work regularly to develop and oversee grant applications for property owners who have submitted flooding-related needs and projects to the Fight the Flood program.

- Staff are continuing to analyze which projects were awarded money and which projects were rejected.
- Sent communications to Supplemental Round 3 applicants to provide notice of DCR's decision to not award their projects.

Project 32167 – DEQ Florence Disaster Living Shoreline Micro-grants

This project will offer grant funds as micro-grants to property owners in the Piankatank River, Gwynns Island, Milford Haven Implementation Plan area to install living shorelines and other eligible BMPs to improve water quality and coastal resilience. It is estimated that four micro-grants of \$20,000 each will be accomplished under this project.

• Construction for two of the five projects is complete and the remaining three are pending. Time of year restrictions for planting is in effect. Contractor is working to develop a final install timeline.

Project 32170 – Virginia Coastal TA FY23

This project provides ongoing support to member localities of the Planning District Commission and other stakeholders committed to improving community development and coastal management within the coastal zone.

- Drafted and distributed press release regarding public fundraiser for needed funds for the PAA Captain Sinclairs public fishing pier construction.
- Participated and hosted training for local government staff for VA Stormwater Management Program opt-out localities on February 28. Coordinated follow-up meeting with DEQ staff tentatively slated for May for Middle Peninsula localities only.
- Consult with Mike Vernon, President of Flood Mitigation Hampton Roads regarding working with registered Fight the Flood citizens looking for BMP solutions across the Middle Peninsula.

- Consulted with a King and Queen County resident residing on Royal Oaks Road regarding accessing properties owned by the Middle Peninsula Chesapeake Bay Public Access Authority for outdoor recreation.
- Continued coordination with Mark Mansfield, President of Shore Consulting regarding required Army Corps of Engineers permit and VMRC Joint Permit Application to dredge Mill Creek boat ramp. Provided Middlesex County with several choices for submitting the JPA to save the county costs.
- Convened the monthly meeting of the local government administrators. Dominion Energy presented on data centers, an opportunity for economic development within rural coastal Virginia. Data centers need to be located in close proximity to transmission towers, and fiber lines.
- Initiated research regarding septic issues at the old Crown Point marina located on Perrin River. Discuss the need for a coordinated meeting with Three Rivers Health District, Delegate, Keith Hodges, and VDH Central office representatives.
- Consulted with legal counsel, representing the new owners for the old Yogi Bear campground in Gloucester County, regarding various septic challenges associated with the campground and funding available to assist.

- Distributed press release highlighting grant funds awarded to region in last two years.
- Photographed shoreline construction projects.
- Updated business listings for Fight the Flood.
- Provided graphic design support to dashboard development for Fight the Flood.

Project 32171 – CZM 306 Next Generation Shoreline Plan Yr2

VIMS Shoreline Studies Program will continue to develop a whitepaper to examine the use of technology, modeling, alternative materials, proprietary products, and innovative nature-based mitigation measures in the planning process for "next generation shorelines" which are intended to provide an enhanced level of shoreline resilience and water quality in response to more frequent and severe flooding and accelerated sea-level rise. One design of a next generation shoreline for a publicly owned property in a moderate energy wave environment publicly owned site will be completed.

- Coordinated with VIMS to finalize subcontract.
- Initiated development of year 2 White Paper by conducting literature research.
- Scheduled field work for assessment of 100-acre new addition at PAA Captain Sinclairs recreation area.

This project will build on the efforts completed between 2020-2021. During this project, PDCs will focus on implementing actions identified in the 36-month Marketing Strategy and Action Plan. MPPDC staff will also develop a grant application to seek funds which address resilience needs identified in the 2022 resilience assessment of MPCBPAA properties. PDCs will also collaborate to identify a long-term sustainability plan for maintaining the site for years to come.

 Completed the Urbanna Historical Water Trail map and integrated the map into the Virginia Water Trails website. MPPDC staff also added an updated the data layer for Middle Peninsula Chesapeake Bay Public Access Authority properties.

- Began to draft a memorandum of understanding between the MPPDC and NNPDC, ANPDC, and PlanRVA with regards to the maintenance of the Virginia Water Trails website starting October 1, 2023.

The project is funded in part with federal funding from NFWF and NOAA via the VA Coastal Zone Management Program.

- Fielded questions on the reissuance of the Bid documents for Hogg Island.

The project will build capacity to address a known gap in local workforce for resilience and restoration activities.

- Initiated preliminary project discission with Knott Alone Hold Fast.
- Since MPPDC staff received the contact for this project 5-months late, MPPDC staff requested an extension on this project. The project was extended to 3/31/24.

Project 38809 – VPA Hole-in-the-Wall Dredging Implementation

Mathews County was awarded VA Port Authority Waterway Maintenance Funding to dredge the Hole in the Wall channel to –7 feet Mean Low Water and place the dredged sand at the county-owned Haven Beach property. MPPDC is administering the grant on behalf of the County with procurement and permitting assistance and project oversight.

- Continued to coordinate with Mathews County legal and Administration staff regarding finalization of the bid packet for the Hole in the Wall dredging project. MPPDC to publish bid packet on behalf of the County.
- Coordinated with Mathews County Administrator to finalize County Monitoring Plan
- Fielded calls from interested citizens and various state and federal agencies regarding the project status.
- Fielded calls from interested dredging contractors and provided updates regarding the upcoming procurement process.
- Met with reporter from VA Mercury regarding the project.

Project 38810 – VPA Aberdeen Dredging

Gloucester County was awarded VA Port Authority Waterway Maintenance Funding to dredge the Aberdeen Creek channel to -7 feet Mean Low Water and place the dredged material at an upland disposal site. MPPDC is administering the grant on behalf of the County with procurement and permitting assistance and project oversight.

- Continued researching in-water dewatering barges and processes, upland dewatering processes and landfill disposal costs. All options are being analyzed to find which option best aligns with the DCR terms and conditions and available project budget limitations.
- Coordinated with staff from Solmax regarding maximum volume of dredged material which can be held at the Middle Peninsula State Park property within the site confines established by DCR.

Project 38811 – DCR Flood Fund - Deltaville Dredging (Middlesex)

Project is for designing and developing draft permit applications for dredging and beneficial reuse or disposal of dredged material and flood/shoaling protection structures at Broad and Jackson Creeks in Middlesex County.

• Coordinated with Middlesex County Board Chair and Administrator on new service agreement. Will initiate project once service agreement is finalized.

TRANSPORTATION

Funding - VDRPT, VDOT, local match from MPPDC General Fund

Project 30219 – Commuter Assistance Program (CAP) Operating FY23

This program assists local commuters and employers with transportation issues. The main emphasis is on lowering the number of single occupancy vehicle commutes within and from the Middle Peninsula region through marketing and promotion of the program through local media and provision of ride matching services to commuters.

- Responded to multiple email inquiries from Kathy Molin of DRPT regarding FY24 CAP Operating project application.
- Agreed to participate in the new Ride Home Rewards pilot program that starts July 1, 2023. Meetings to discuss specifics will be initiated by Kathy Molin of DRPT with the first meeting expected later this month.
- Forwarded DRPT "Discover Transit Month" marketing campaign email to Stephanie Heinatz of Consociate Media for her review/use.
- Provided Kathy Molin of DRPT with excel spreadsheet and backup documentation of media products

provided by Consociate Media that coincide with FY23 reimbursement requests.

- Coordinated with Stephanie Heinatz of Consociate Media to include DRPT events Discover Transit (April and September), Connecting Commuters (October), and Bike to Work Day (May) in our FY24 marketing calendar.
- Communicated to Stephanie of Consociate Media that DRPT is cracking down on receiving Consociate's media documentation with each invoice included in our reimbursement requests. Kathy Molin of DRPT has admitted that she had "been lazy in asking for them", but "moving forward, (she) will require these." Without these, our reimbursements will be held up. Provided Stephanie with DRPTs "Purple Book" which provides details of how to administer DRPT grant funds including reimbursement requirements found in Chapter 6.
- Participated in monthly conference call with Kathy Molin of DRPT.
- Scheduled meeting between MPPDC, DRPT, and Consociate Media for March 28th for introductions and a general program discussion as this has not been done before due to Covid.
- Participated in discussions with various transit partners regarding a potential name rebranding for Commute!VA.
- Responded to email forwarded from Lisa Hull at NNPDC. Hannah Swann of Gloucester Counseling Center who has a client in need of transportation to and from work a few days in March. The to/from locations are within the Middle Peninsula. Provided our MidPenRideshare program information for the client to attempt a rideshare match.
- Responded to Kathy Molin of DRPT regarding questions surrounding how the agency plans on updating our CAP Strategic Plan. We will not be hiring a consultant and we cannot use CAP Operating funds to complete this task. We did not apply for a TA grant as there is a 50% match requirement. PDC staff will research and update the CAP Strategic Plan following the requirements provided by DRPT.
- Received an invitation from Ken Pollock of Bay Aging CFO to represent the Middle Peninsula as part of a Transit Sub-Group in a monthly 60–90-minute Zoom meeting. The group will be reviewing needs and gaps in transportation identified by the local RAFT committees. CFO has tentatively agreed, but verifying with Kathy Molin of DRPT if this is something allowable by the program.
- Current commuter database in February 432
- Number of Commuters with logged alt mode trips in February 84
- Number of logged alt trips in February 510
- Reduced miles (VMT) in February 12,147
- Commuter Savings in February \$7,592

Project 30320 – Rural Transportation Planning FY23

This program provides rural transportation planning services through the Rural Transportation Planning Work Program which outlines specific tasks and goals to guide the rural planning of transportation services.

- Continued to explore options for contracting with consultant to run new LRTP project screening process.
- Coordinated and hosted the MPPDC Local Government Planners meeting on February 22. Agenda items included a presentation from VDOT regarding the VDOT Resilience Plan; 2023 General Assembly updates; discussion on proposed consolidation of state stormwater and E&S programs; and dredging and coastal resilience project updates.
- Participated in the VDOT Rural Park & Ride Counts and Conditions Assessment Training on February 23 and prepared to initiate regional park and ride surveys during March and April.

- Participated in the VDOT Coordination meeting for MPOs and PDCs on February 28 where discussion involved regarding the FY2024 rural transportation program grant scope, Smart Scale and VTrans.
- Coordinated with VDOT Resilience Program staff regarding assessment of transportation infrastructure now subject to the sea level rise design standards adopted in 2020.
- Initiated development of proposal for FY24 VDOT RTP funding with plans to submit the final application prior to the April deadline.
- Staff applied and submitted a grant application to Virginia Outdoors Foundation Get Outdoors Funding for \$25,000 for the building of unimproved trails at Captain Sinclairs Recreational Area.

Project 32169 – USDOT RAISE Public Working Waterfront Designs

Project is to conduct a region-wide planning project that will result in a suite of shovel-ready, high-priority multi-modal transportation infrastructure improvements intended to address critical needs related to the region's publicly owned working waterfronts in order to meet the modern and future needs of the region's growing commercial seafood and maritime industries. The project will involve three distinct tasks: 1) State of Good Repair Condition Assessments, 2) Multimodal Working Waterfront Needs Assessment and Improvement Strategies, and 3) Multimodal Working Waterfront Improvement Plan Development.

- Participated in post-award kickoff meeting led by Gerald Hill of MARAD on March 6. Discussed contract requirements and reimbursement mechanisms. Reimbursement requests can be submitted monthly with typical turnaround time of 1-2 weeks.
- Developed scope language to support legal counsel's development of procurement materials.

ONSITE REPAIR & PUMPOUT

Funding - Grants, VRA Loan Funds, local match from MPPDC General Fund, cost sharing

Project 30194 – RAFT Dupont LMI Pumpouts

This project will provide grant funding to ~55 LMI Middle Peninsula homeowners to assist them in complying with the Chesapeake Bay Preservation Act requirement to have their septic tanks pumped out or inspected every 5 years.

- As of March 13, a total of 74 applications for septic pumpout assistance were provided to Middle Peninsula homeowners in person, by mail, and electronically. Staff received, reviewed, and approved 33 applications. Vouchers were issued on a first-come, first-served basis to all 33 applicants.

Project 32163 – DEQ 319(h) NPS IP for BMP Residential Septic 2021

Provides cost-share assistance to landowners, homeowners, and agricultural operators as an incentive to voluntarily install nonpoint source (NPS) best management practices (BMPs) in designated watersheds.

• As of March 13, MPPDC staff has received phone calls from 118 homeowners in Gloucester, Mathews, and Middlesex Counties in response to the press release for available 319(h) funding. The physical addresses of each of these septic systems were entered into the mapping tool to verify their location is within the program's target areas. (31) homeowners had miscellaneous requests, declined moving forward, requested ineligible practices such as voluntary upgrades and reimbursement for work completed prior to program launch; (3) Mathews County homeowners placed their project on hold; and (48) homeowners' septic system isn't located in the program's target area. To-date, (2) Alternative Septic Systems in Mathews County have been installed (2) Septic Systems in Middlesex County, (1) in Gloucester County, and (2) in Mathews County have been pumped out. All 7 homeowners were approved and reimbursed 50% of the average practice cost set by DEQ.

(12) Homeowners remain on the Septic Pumpout list. (5 Mathews, 5 Middlesex, 2 Gloucester)

- (17) Homeowners remain on the Septic Repair/Replacement list. (13 Mathews, 3 Middlesex, 1 Gloucester)
- Continue to receive inquiries from King William, King & Queen, and Essex County residents looking for septic assistance and are not in the designated target area set by DEQ to be eligible for 319(h) septic reimbursement funding. When applicable, these inquiries are referred to VDH for SWAP intake/screening, VA DHCD, USDA, and SERCAP for possible septic repair/replacement assistance and those seeking septic pumpout assistance are screened for the RAFT program.

Project 32173 VDH Septic Well Assistance Program (SWAP)

This project will provide grant funding to assist VDH approved low-income Middle Peninsula homeowners with costs associated with septic repair/installation, private well installation/abandonment, and connecting to public water and sewer for the purposes of wastewater/water improvements.

- Received phone call from Essex County homeowner on social security, in need of a well and is currently having to purchase water. The homeowner became extremely emotional and frustrated when referred to their local health department to begin the process for SWAP assistance. Homeowner reported they had already contacted Essex County Health Department who told them they do not have any funds or programs available, mentioned our office, and gave them two documents referring them to USDA and SERCAP for assistance. Staff explained to the homeowner the SWAP process is still a work in progress, obtained their contact information, and told them I would direct it to the appropriate person.
- Received phone call from Essex County homeowner requesting information regarding well assistance. Homeowner has an elderly neighbor without running water. Caller was referred to their local health department to begin the process for SWAP assistance.
- Received email from Kristal at ChurchView Septic asking to contact Middlesex County homeowner in need of septic repair assistance.
- Received several voicemails from Middlesex County homeowner in need of septic repair assistance.
- Received email from Brenden Rivenbark, Chief Operating Officer at Three Rivers Health District informing MPPDC staff they are ready to begin vetting MP homeowners interested in SWAP.

- Responded to email from Kristal at ChurchView Septic informing her I had spoken with Lisa regarding the Middlesex County homeowner seeking financial assistance for their septic repair project. The only septic program available to Middlesex County homeowners at this time, is the SWAP program at the health department. Staff will contact the homeowner and have them contact their local health department to begin the application process.
- Received email from Gloucester County Environmental Health Specialist with questions regarding the amount of available SWAP funds, Alternative Septic System designs, and processing times. Email was forwarded to MPPDC Executive Director, Lewie Lawrence for assistance.
- Responded to Gloucester County Environmental Health Specialist's questions with applicable information at hand. Three Rivers Health District Chief Operating Officer, Brenden Rivenbark and Environmental Health Manager, David Fridley were included in the response.
- Reviewed VDH ARPA SWAP FAQ and emailed questions to Nicole Sandberg, VDH Wastewater Infrastructure Manager. This information will be included in the press release.

MPPDC agreed to service Middle Peninsula Business Development Partnership's (MPBDP) Small Business Loan Portfolio after MPBDP's dissolution November 30, 2011. MPPDC established a revolving loan fund and staff initiate ACH loan payments from clients' bank accounts and manages the accounts. Principal repaid will be held until the Commission determines the best use for these funds as allowed by the USDA (RBEG) original lending restrictions. Interest earned will be used to offset administration costs.

Project 30187 – VHDA Affordable Workforce Housing Development

The three-year project will involve planning, designing, and constructing approximately ten affordable workforce housing units on property owned by the Middle Peninsula Public Access Authority. The project goals involve creating resilient and safe housing for citizens who need to live and work on or near the water. The designs will involve long-range planning for increased flooding and sea-level rise where the units can be readily moved once a site becomes unsafe for continued residential use.

Project 300132 – Energy Efficiency and Conservation Block Grant (EECBG) Revolving Loan Fund

The program emphasizes a community-based approach to help meet energy and climate protection goals. MPPDC was awarded a contract to provide weatherization renovations to 12 homeowners ineligible for LMI weatherization programs in each of the 6 counties. MPPDC subcontracted the promotion and construction portions of this project to Bay Aging but was tasked with administering the overall project. MPPDC is administering the revolving loan program per DMME.

• Funds available – \$45,606

EMERGENCY SERVICES Funding – VDEM/FEMA/Homeland Security

Project 31212 – Middle Peninsula All-Hazards Mitigation Plan Update Yr2

MPPDC staff will work with participating localities to update the 2016 All-Hazards Mitigation Plan. The plan will address mitigation of several natural hazards impacting the region.

- Submitted project closeout packet to VDEM and awaiting response.
- FEMA reviewed the HAZUS from the 2021 plan and suggested data updates to improve the overall analysis. With this information MPPDC Staff will seek funding prior to the next AHMP update to enhance regional and local data.
- *Drafted the email to* AHMP Committee Members to collect updates to the All Hazards Mitigation Plan. This is part of the annual plan review that is required by FEMA.

LOAN FUNDS FOR SEPTIC AND LIVING SHORELINES Funding – VRA

Project 30420/30428 – On-Site Technical Guidance Assistance and Loan Program

The On-Site Technical Guidance Program aids the Middle Peninsula localities and residents in the technical understanding and implementation of approaches to address On-Site Disposal Systems and improve water quality by assisting local homeowners with repairing failing septic systems through low-interest loans and/or

grants. In addition, MPPDC received funding under the Water Quality Improvement Fund (WQIF) to provide grants to low-to-moderate income Middle Peninsula and New Kent County homeowners to repair failing septic systems impacting water quality and health in the region. Grants can be paired with loans from the MPPDC Onsite Wastewater Revolving Loan Fund to provide matching funds as required. It is anticipated this funding will be used to provide assistance to 20-27 homeowners.

- Continued to work with various clients interested in loan financing for septic repair.
- Lawyer's Title closed new septic loan for Gloucester County homeowner on March 8th. Prepared check to Miller's for 50% of repair so that homeowner could schedule a start date.
- Remaining uncommitted septic repair funds: \$115,935 in loan funds \$42,081 in grant funds.

Project 31500 – Living Shoreline Loan Program

The MPPDC Living Shoreline Incentive Program Loan Fund provides low interest loans to local homeowners to implement living shorelines. These funds will be used for erosion prevention and water quality control and to protect and enhance natural shoreline habitats using strategically placed plants, stone, sand fill and other structural and organic materials.

Coastal Policy Team (CPT): The CPT, whose members and alternates represent the Virginia Coastal Zone Management Program's key partners and eight planning district commissions, provides a forum for discussion and resolution of cross-cutting coastal resource management issues. Members serve on the team at the discretion of their agency or planning district commission director. The CPT recommends funding levels to the DEQ Director for coastal zone management projects. (MPPDC Staff 15 years +)

Virginia Coastal Resilience Master Plan Technical Advisory Committee: As appointed by the Governor in EO-71, a Technical Advisory Committee (TAC) with representatives of state agencies, coastal planning districts and regional commissions, and academic advisors, among others will facilitate the coordination and the development of the Virginia Coastal Resilience Master Plan. The Commonwealth's Chief Resilience Officer, Special Assistant to the Governor for Coastal Adaptation and Protection, and TAC will work with localities, regional entities, citizens, and stakeholder groups to identify critical infrastructure, at-risk communities, adaptation strategies, and specific resilience projects for inclusion in the Plan.

Congressman Robert Wittman's Fisheries Advisory Committee and Environmental Advisory Committee: (MPPDC Staff 8 years +) **Virginia Sea Grant Program External Advisory Committee (EAC):** The EAC provides stakeholder input on the strategic planning process, the research proposal review process, and on Commonwealth-wide trends and needs. The EAC is a diverse group of end-users including representatives from state agencies, the education community, coastal planning and management, the private sector, and NGOs. (MPPDC Staff 9 years+)

Virginia Shoreline Working Group: The Virginia Coastal Zone Management Program launched the working group in 2022 to focus in on complex regulatory and legal matters pertaining to shoreline management and to help advance shoreline protection and habitat restoration projects that can compete for federal funding.

Virginia Bay Enhancement Working Group (BEWG): The Northam Administration and VMRC launched BEWG in 2020 as result of administration policy of no future overboard discharge of dredged material. The group is tasked with identifying beneficial reuse opportunities for the 1 Million cubic yards of material that is dredged every 3-5 years from the York Spit Navigation Channel which is the primary shipping channel for the Baltimore Harbor in the southern section of the middle of the Chesapeake Bay. MPPDC staff were requested to serve to evaluate alternatives from around the Bay and including the Middle Peninsula.

Market Overview & Trends



- VA is home to the #1 Data Center Market in the World
- 2022 Peak Load: 2,767 MW (equivalent to 685,700 homes)
- 21% of Dominion Energy's electricity sales as of 2022
- Fastest growing customer segment in VA
 - Annual growth: 450+ MW
 - Continued growth opportunities for the foreseeable future
 - DE has connected 75 data centers in the last 3 years
- Increased interest in sites outside Loudoun and Prince William
- Typical data center customer is 30 MW, typical large industrial customer is 30 MW



<u>1: Cloud</u>

- Cloud providers offer cloud based operating systems and applications
- Typically, large buildings and clusters on a campus or in a tight geographic area.
- Purpose built for the specifics of the cloud company
- Examples: Amazon, Microsoft, Google
- This is the largest data center segment of customers in VA
- Heavy concentration in Northern VA



2: Colocation

- Datacenter operator builds the building and leases data halls to end users who install the servers
- Similar to a hotel for other companies' servers
- Operator provides the facility power, cooling and physical security
- Examples: Digital Realty, Equinix, QTS
- This is the second largest segment of data center customers in VA
- This segment currently targets Northern VA



<u>3: Enterprise</u>

- The user of the datacenter owns and operates the building for its purposes
- Examples: Facebook, banks, US Government
- This segment tends to locate throughout VA, not just in Northern VA

4: Fiber Interconnection Facility

- Point where fiber cables and networks meet and connect
- These tend to be very small facilities
- This segment tends to locate throughout VA, not just in Northern VA

5: Crypto Miners

- These customers operate dedicated facilities to mine cryptocurrencies
- This segment tends to locate outside of Northern VA
- This is a very volatile industry and does not tend to remain in business for long periods of time

What does a data center look like?



- 2 story buildings, approximately 125,000 sq. ft.
- 25 to 30 acres per building
- Onsite substation & transmission infrastructure
- Approximately 10 employees per building
- Complete onsite diesel generation & fuel storage
- Security fencing & guarded access points

Must-Haves to be Competitive

- Support for new transmission infrastructure
- Support from local government:
 - Advanced planning & zoning
 - Fast track program Site planning & permitting
 - Favorable tax rates
- Access to transmission / fiber infrastructure
- Low cost of electricity
- Renewables generation

Transmission Infrastructure



- Data Centers require transmission & substation infrastructure
 - Evaluate local appetite for new infrastructure
 - Proximity to site is important
 - Standard 230,000 kV right of way is 100' to 150'





Site Selection



- Look for sites adjacent or close to existing transmission
 - Look for sites where fiber and electricity intersect
 - Less infrastructure equals faster time-to-market
 - Approximately 75 to 150 acres per site, but larger sites are becoming the norm
- Engage Dominion Energy to assess transmission adjacent to sites
- New transmission construction timeframe is 3 to 4 years in rural areas

Cost of Electricity



- Electricity is the most expensive operational cost for a data center facility
- Data Center customers want a variety of rate options
 - Market-based rate
 - Renewable rate options





Other Infrastructure

- Need fiber infrastructure
- Need access to water/ sewer capacity
 - Requirements vary significantly based on user
- Engage infrastructure owners to understand capacity and routes

Tax Rates



Tax rates on computing equipment MUST be competitive, especially in NEW areas

• Customer prefer published rates, not special tax deals or abatements
